#### Late to School

Students are expected to be on time (here and ready to line up with their class to come inside when the bell rings at 8:25) at the start of the school day and for their classes throughout the school day. A student is considered tardy if they arrive at school up to 15 minutes after the

designated start time. In addition to missed learning opportunities for the tardy student, tardiness to class or to school causes disruption to the learning environment for all students. Patterns of severe tardiness call for intervention by the teacher, the principal, and/or the school's student services staff. Questions about your school's absence procedures can be directed to your school administrator(s).

#### School Information:

- Students arriving to school up until 8:45 a.m. are tardy.
- When a student gets to school after 8:45 a.m. they are considered a third of a day unexcused absence.
- If your child is ill or is going to be late, please leave a message on the Safe Arrival line 442-2085 (a 24 hours a day, seven days a week answering machine). If a parent does not report an illness, an appointment or tardiness to the school, it will be recorded as an unexcused absence.

#### **NOTE FROM THE NURSE:**

Winter is almost here!! Your children will be expected to come to school with snow pants, boots, gloves, and hats. If you are unable to provide these to your student please contact the nurse or social worker, and we will assist you in getting what you need.

# <u>Is Your Child Well Enough To Go To School?</u>

It is not always easy to decide if your child is sick enough to stay home or well enough to be in school. Children who come to school are expected, with few exceptions, to participate fully in school activities.

Here are some guidelines that might help in a parent's decision-making:

- Fever: A fever of 100 degrees or more signals an illness that is probably going to make a student uncomfortable and unable to function well in class. Your child should stay home until he/she is feeling better.
- 2. <u>Vomiting, Diarrhea or Severe Nausea</u>: These are symptoms that require a student to remain at home until a normal diet is tolerated the night before and the morning of school.
- 3. Infectious Diseases: Diseases such as impetigo, pink eye with thick drainage, and strep throat require a doctor's examination and prescription for medication. Contacting the health care provider and using the medicine as directed for the full recommended length of time are necessary. Once medication has been started and the child is feeling well, he/she may return to school.

Students with chicken pox may return to school when all the scabs are completely dried and no new lesions are developing (usually 5-7 days).

 Rashes: Rashes or patches of broken, itchy skin need to be examined by a health care provider if they appear to be spreading or not improving. 5. <u>Injuries</u>: If a student has an injury that causes continuous discomfort, the student should not attend school until the condition is checked by a health care provider or it improves. Injuries that interfere with class participation need a medical evaluation. If participation in physical education classes is not recommended, a medical excuse is required.

# When is school closed due to weather?

When the weather is bad, the Madison Metropolitan School District follows a set of guidelines for deciding if school will be open or closed. The district must make a decision that is the best for all students. We realize our decisions may create an inconvenience with your individual circumstances. Therefore, we encourage and strongly support you in making the decision that is best for your child(ren). You are always the best judge of your child's health and safety.

# The process for deciding when schools are open or closed due to snow and/or ice

District staff members review the weather conditions beginning early in the morning. They talk with weather forecasters, the City Streets Department, Madison Police and Dane County Sheriff's Departments, and school district staff to see if all buildings are accessible for students and staff.

MMSD consults with bus companies to see if buses will be able to travel safely to and from school. MMSD administration makes the decision whether to close schools by 6:30 a.m. or earlier, and then communicates this decision to all local news outlets and to parents via email, phone and text message.

### How you can find out if schools are closed?

On days when the weather is bad, listen to any local radio or television station for information about school closing. If during registration you have provided an email address and/or text message phone number in the parent portal to the Infinite Campus student information system, you will be contacted in the morning regarding a school closing. ## When schools are closed because of extreme cold

When the National Weather Service has a wind chill WARNING for Dane County in effect for the time just before the school day begins, we will make a decision if our schools should close. It is quite likely we will make this type of closing decision on the morning of the day in question. If there is a wind chill ADVISORY (and not a WARNING) for the county, schools will likely be open.

## When schools are closed, all activities are canceled

When Madison schools are closed for the day, it also means that all activities scheduled in school buildings for that day are canceled. This includes all MSCR programs and all after school programs.

# Why schools are generally not dismissed early on days when the weather is bad

In many of our families, adults work outside the home and they have no child care arrangements available before the end of the school day. However, if your schedule allows and if you feel your child(ren) will be safer at home, you can pick your child(ren) up before the end of the school day. If you do, go to the school office and request that your child(ren) be dismissed to you.

#### We try to keep schools open

When schools close, many families have issues with child care. As a result, we try to keep schools open if it's safe to do so. However, as we stated at the top of this letter, parents can always make the decision to keep their child(ren) at home in bad weather.

# Why school starts are not delayed on days when the weather is bad but will improve during the day

In many of our families, adults working outside the home are not able to adjust their work schedules or find child care to accommodate a later start. If your family transports your child(ren) to school, we appreciate the extra effort it takes on severe weather days and we acknowledge that the students' arrival might be somewhat delayed.

## When schools are closed for other reasons

If you have a question about whether schools or a particular school will be closed for reasons other than severe weather, we will communicate via email to those parents/guardians who have provided their email address to us via Infinite Campus – the online student information system. You can also listen to local radio or television stations, go to the school's Web site or watch MMSD-TV.

## Thank you for your understanding and cooperation

For every family which is happy that school is in session on days when the weather is bad, there is another family that feels schools should be closed. The decision to open or close schools during inclement weather brings out some of the strongest

community reactions – no matter which way we go with our weather decisions.

We appreciate your understanding of the difficulties in making this decision, and your support in helping your child get to school safely on winter days. Please know that we will use safety considerations in making all of our weather decisions.

## To Be a Successful Chávez Volunteer

#### **Attendance and Punctuality**

Be sure to sign in at the main office each day you volunteer and wear a name tag.

Notify the school if you cannot come in as scheduled.

Teachers are asked to notify you of any changes.

#### **Awareness**

You may, or may not, work directly with your own child or in your child's classroom.

There are a variety of tasks and jobs for volunteers. Some tasks can be accomplished at your home.

#### **School Support**

Provide adult support for students when working in the classroom.

Share your talents, interests, and cultural background.

Volunteers are welcome in "Specials" classes.

Give students feedback and encourage them to do their best.

Help students focus their attention to the tasks at hand.

Ask children open-ended questions to help them solve problems and tasks –avoid doing the work for them.

#### Respect

Be respectful of all children's abilities and learning styles.

Avoid making judgments and comparisons between or among students and/or classrooms.

Leave younger children at home so that you can give your task undivided attention.

Please put your cell phone on vibrate or turn it off.

#### **Discipline**

Follow the teacher's lead and let the teacher handle disciplinary actions.

You are in a position of trust when working with children.

Maintain open communication with your teacher at all times.

#### Confidentiality

Remember, when you are volunteering at Chávez Elementary School you are seen as a professional.

You must follow the policies of the Madison Metropolitan School District.

Each student has the right to privacy.

At no time should you share any student information outside the classroom.

#### **Welcome New Staff Members**

Hello, my name is Meghan Caylor. I am the Talented and Gifted (TAG) Instructional Resource Teacher (IRT) for your child's school for the 2012-2013 school year. We are really moving toward a Response to Intervention (RtI) model within TAG, where we consistently look at data in order to find students or groups of students who may be outliers from their peer group. Rather than a "program", TAG is a continuum of services based upon how far a child is beyond core. Interventions, then, include supplemental and replacement curriculum to keep students challenged.

Another focus in TAG this year is shortterm enrichment to help further develop talent. These groups are not interventions, but rather opportunities for growth and continued interest.

#### **Spring Harbor Middle School**

Spring Harbor Middle School is an environmental science magnet school located in the Memorial attendance area. Any student who lives in the Memorial area is eligible to apply for Spring Harbor's lottery. Priority in enrollment will be given to students living in the former Spring Harbor Elementary School attendance area and to siblings of students currently attending Spring Harbor who will continue to attend as 7th or 8th graders next year. Fifty percent of the students will come from Jefferson attendance area and 50% will come from the Toki attendance area. Each year 90 students are selected to attend.

At 6:00 p.m. on January 10, 2013 and 7:00 p.m. on January 16, 2013 Principal Leia Esser and her staff will be conducting parent informational meetings in the Spring Harbor library. In addition, a member of Spring Harbor staff will be visiting with our fifth grade students on January 9, 2013.

- where to go if parent(s) are not home

- whether your child knows how to cross streets safely
- whether your child knows how to walk home
